

#### MY SPRING WATCH

Spring in The Rank starts toward the end of March and this year was no exception. The Violet Oil Beetles make an appearance and after an intensive period of mating disappear from view until next spring however the common frog (Rana Temporaia) seems to know exactly where to look for them and two or three of these picture book frogs have spent a lot of time stalking the oil beetles on the front garden of 64 during late March and early April.

We had a family of what may have been Bank Voles however these may have fallen foul to the

rising cat population as has the Yellow Necked Field Mouse and neither species have been seen since mid- April maybe they will turn up again next spring again.





Regarding birds; 9<sup>th</sup> May - Swifts arrived which is the same day as last year.

More Blackbirds this year than last. However no Song Thrushes until this week and three fledglings have ben resident on the Nap and have since moved on with a sighting in the back garden of 64.

Cuckoo was heard this year on 11<sup>th</sup> May and for several days thereafter, which is a recovery from last year when it was quite absent.

The lone Red Kite evident over head in the early part of the year seems to have a mate and has reared two or three fledglings which have been

seen above the fields flanking Bradley Lane at silage harvest time having flying training but being harassed by Rooks and Crows and a single Buzzard. The Red Kites have appeared to have withdrawn I guess discretion being the better part of valour.

Greater Spotted Woodpecker with 2 fledglings have discovered the peanuts and have been down most days.

Legend has it that there are three species of Sparrow - House, Hedge and Tree. The House Sparrow (Domesticus) and the Hedge Sparrow (Dunnock) are in abundance this year with successful broods being produced. However, the Tree Sparrow I think is a myth having watched and been satisfied that none of these birds have appeared in The Rank however maybe further afield. Swifts again have occupied 7 nesting sites between 66 and 63 The Rank hopefully they will have a good breeding season. However, one casualty a young Swift fell out of its nest and is



being reared by Peter Dean who is feeding it on flies and other live foodstuff under the guidance of the RSPB this little chap has been named Taylor and has been ringed.

#### The West Highland Way - A journey to remember

We set out on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> from Milngavie (Pronounced Mul-guy) into a slightly dreary typical Scottish summer's day, the trail was clearly marked and there were a good number of walkers around. Quite quickly the promise of the Highlands could be seen, with teases of the hills and distant views of the Mountains to come. A stop at the pub for lunch and feet out for a much needed airing was welcomed. We ended the first day at Kip in the Kirk, Drymen; a fabulous bunkhouse and soon met a band of fellow walkers for a pub supper.

Day 2 we headed towards Conic hill, our first climb, with the trepidation of heavy rain over the Loch ahead and new friend Thymen from Holland. I prayed it would pass us by for the climb but as soon as we started the accent we were in a zero visibility rain belt. We trudged to the top with forced grins. After a small detour to the summit of the hill, we were blessed with a tease of a view over the Loch and the promise of blue skies of which we were duly rewarded with a panoramic view of the Long Loch Lomond. Another lunch stop of gorgeous toasties and we pressed on to Rowardennan and a stunning old Lodge on the shores of Loch Lomond as the venue of our stay at the Youth Hostel.

Day 3, led us along the shores of Loch Lomond, which seemed to last forever, a real scramble over rocky outcrops and over large tree roots, climbing ladders and boulders with midges to pester every stop for a boot lace, or a rummage in the backpack. We pushed on to Inversnaid and took a long detour to the most gorgeous Bunkhouse in a converted Chapel to take lunch under cover from the wee Midges. We were rewarded with a top class lunch and my first try of Haggis, Neeps & Tatties with a sumptuous whiskey cream sauce. Pushing on over the scramble that is the shores of the Loch we found ourselves on a secluded beach (see photo attached), the wind had dropped and the sun appeared making for a magical retreat where we rested and recharged our batteries.



Day 4. After a fabulous & favourite stay at Beinglas farm, in a very basic little wooden wigwam and a feed of hearty curry and a few beers the night before, we set off for Tyndrum, through a beautiful wide valley overlooking The Munroes of Crainlarich; Ben More & Stob Binnein (1165m). Emotions were running high as we walked through this stunning and awe inspiring land. A real sense of how big & beautiful this world is filled us both. We stopped for coffee at a small campsite in the valley and made friends with a plucky little Female Chaffinch who took shortbread crumbs from Wendy's boot, while this could happen in any city park somehow the connection felt different out here in Scotland's wilderness. We arrived tired at Tyndrum where we stayed in a wee Hobbit house (wooden barrel cabin).

**Day 5** – The big day, 20 miles from Tyndrum to Kingshouse, over Rannoch Moor. We had prayed for good weather for this day as it is the most exposed section of the way and I really didn't want to spend 9

hours walking in the wind and rain. Thank fully we were rewarded with a light breeze and blue skies. We started early and had the trail to ourselves, meeting beautiful, gentle yet huge Highland cattle along the way, continuing over the picturesque Bridge of Orchy and onto Rannoch Moor. Here the only sound was the wind and the crunch of our boots on the path could be heard. Britain's largest wilderness is magical place and it almost feels like an intrusion to be there. I wanted to hover so as not to make any noise. Our feet ached and the painkillers came out finally we saw the welcome site of the Kingshouse hotel at the head of Glen Coe under the majesty of my favourite brute of a Munro, Buachaille Etive Mor. The night ended with music, dancing & possibly too much Malt Whiskey with fellow walkers in the bar of the Kingshouse hotel.

#### West Highland Way- Continued

Day 6 – A shorter day and through Glen Coe, the site of the Massacre of the MacDonald clan which took place in 1692. The Glen still seems to hold the air of battle within it and being my 4<sup>th</sup> visit to what is my favourite wild place in Scotland I still sense the emotions in the hills around us. Coming over the Moor yesterday and seeing Buachaille Etive Mor, made me feel like I was marching into battle, the heart rate rises, the step increases. I almost hear cries of battle ready Highlanders. Today we climb to the Devils staircase where at the summit (and highest point of the way at 1850ft) we are rewarded with the most stunning views and we believe to be a glimpse of Ben Nevis in the distance. We descend after soaking in the summit for almost 2 hours, my head now thankfully clearing of the night before. Into Kinlochleven, the site of a redundant Aluminium smelter and it's dramatic hydro plant running cutting alien like through the green of the valley and another hearty pub meal with new friends ended with more singing together in the hostel before bed.

Day 7 - Our last day and despite the 80 miles covered so far our morning was spent trying not to



feel sad that it was the last day. We had made so many good friends along the way, shared many stories of our day's walks and the sites and feelings we experienced. It felt like we had become a community of walkers, a band of Brothers of the wilderness. We headed towards the base of Britain's highest Mountain after our last hearty Full Scottish Breakfast! And into one of the only days of rain we had over all 7 days. Determined to stay in my shorts we pressed on to be rewarded with spine tingling views of Ben Nevis, "with his hat on" (shrouded in cloud at the summit) as one of our fellow 'waylanders' commented. Coming into Fort William, cars passed us by and the return to civilisation was

unwanted and intrusive to the peace we had found in the hills for 7 days. This feeling soon subsided when we reached the town and shared elated celebration of completing the walk with each other and many of the band of walkers we had met on the way. The night ended in the wee small hours after much conversation, refreshments and dancing with our merry 'Waylander' friends.

The way had been more than a walk, much more, a journey into the wilderness, a retreat into our own selves, time to think, time to be. Time that will never be forgotten.

Day 8 - The Ben! Waking with thick heads was maybe not the best way to start an accent on Britain's highest mountain but the celebrations of the night before were not regretful. The weather forecast was mixed, with stories of 60mph winds, -10c summit conditions mixed with, it might clear up this afternoon!? We stayed in bed a while longer and left just after 11, stocking up on Butter tablet, Shortbread and other Highland sweeties from a charity stall in town to keep us going along with a flask of coffee and all our winter gear ready for the summit. It rained on and off and we saw more people coming down the mountain soaked and cold and looking very downbeat than those going up. Progress was slow and steady. Visibility was poor. After several hours of climbing we reached the ravine towards the Lochan and was met with the strongest winds I have ever experienced, the wind was moving our feet as we lifted them to take the next step. We pushed on to the Lochan and stopped to put our next layer of clothing on under our waterproofs. Reports from those descending were not good and the wind was apparently worse as you climbed. Being pushed around by this torrent of a force was scary, and alone with no guide we made the difficult decision, and the right decision to head back.



**Continued from pg. 8** - We are not experienced Mountaineers and the Mountain will always be there. Wendy was bitterly disappointed but as I reminded her, this only means we have to come back to Scotland again very soon to try for the summit, our spirits lifted a little and the Nevis Inn was a welcome site as we came back to the Glen, a couple of pints of Scottish brew left us both feeling a whole lot better. We both agreed we will be back.

Our trip was self-funded and done without support of a guide or group. We started alone, just the 2 of us but ended with so many new friends. The way is well marked and the terrain and distance while challenging at times it achievable to anyone with good fitness and sound boots.

#### Cycling Down the Danube -

For our cycling holiday this year we cycled 600 miles down the Danube from its source in Germany to Vienna in Austria. The cycle route is part of Eurovelo route 6 which goes from St Nazaire on the Atlantic coast, all the way to the estuary of the Danube on the Black Sea.

The part we completed last year down the Loire in France and the part down the Danube in Germany and Austria are the most popular and most well supported by excellent signage, dedicated well surfaced cycle paths and cyclist tourist infrastructure.

The key word on our cycle trips is "down" and our route started at 700 metres above sea level in Donaueschingen and finished at about 200 metres in Vienna (with a few small "blips" in between).

The scenery varied from quiet paths along the small river and adjacent fields at the beginning, then rocky gorges and beautiful towns and cathedral cities and finally to the majestic river sweeping past vineyards and wooded slopes dotted with castles and monasteries before arriving in Vienna, one of the most beautiful cities in Europe. As is often the case in Europe (unlike the UK), the cycle paths were almost always traffic free and finished in perfectly smooth tarmac.

This year we "cheated" slightly and took the bikes on the car to the start, then cycled in four day stints followed by a "rest" day when I would catch a train back to the last stop to retrieve the car ... and so on. This meant that we only needed to carry clothes for four days and could fill the boot up with dirty washing instead of carrying it in our panniers!

We have tried to give a flavour of our trip in the attached photos but if anyone is interested in a similar holiday we will be pleased to share our experiences.

#### Recipe Quick Salad Dressing

1 oz butter 1 oz flour 1/4 pint milk 1/4 pint water 1/2 teaspoon dried basil Salt and pepper 1 egg yolk 2 tbsp fresh lemon juice

Melt the butter in a saucepan, stir in the flour and cook for one minute. Gradually mix in the milk and water and bring to the boil stirring continuously.



Stir in the basil and seasoning and remove from the heat.

Beat the egg yolk and lemon juice together and add 2 tablespoons of the hot sauce, mix and then add to the rest of the sauce, returning the pan to the heat, stirring continuously and not allowing the mixture to boil.

Leave to cool before dressing the salad.





