Parish Council 10th July 2012

Parish Steward. The weeds in Church Street have been sprayed. If parishioners know of any other areas that need de-weeding please contact the Clerk.

Community Emergency Volunteer Plan. The Clerk has had no contact from anyone willing to offer their services should an emergency ever occur in the parish. She is desperate to put a plan together so that the parish would be well prepared in the case of an event. Please contact her If you feel you could help in an emergency or could supply equipment like generators, water pumps, etc. or would be willing to help the infirm.

Co-option LGA 1972 s16A. Council agreed to Co-opt Sarah Fry onto the Council. The team are looking forward to working with her.

Localism Act 2011 – Code of Conduct. Council agreed to adopt and abide by the Wiltshire Council Code of Conduct. Details of the Code can be found on the Wiltshire Council website if you wish to know more about it.

Village Hall. Following long discussions on the different views that were brought to the meeting the Parish Council have agreed it would be appropriate for the Parish Council to arrange a consultation exercise with the village as a whole, to look at the future of the village hall premises and the proposal for a community centre to be built on the recreational area. The Clerk will seek advice on consultations and report back to Councillors by email. They will then approve the booking of the Hall and any other items required for a consultation exercise. Parishioners will be informed of the arrangements in the Parish News and on the noticeboards.

Grant Applications LGA 1972 s137. Only one application was received and the Parish Council agreed to match fund the Youth Club up to £200 for the sponsored cycle ride they are to hold.

Recreational Area Football Club. Council confirmed it was happy for the football team arrangement to continue as per the previous year. If you have a child that is interested in football and would like to take part in the club, go to the Recreation Ground on a Sunday and speak to the coaches.

Mendip District Council. Appeal put into the Secretary of State regarding Land at Bunns Lane West Woodlands Nr Frome Proposal Erection of Poultry Buildings etc. The appeal reference is APP/Q3305/ A/12/2176896/NWF. The Parish Council agreed to still support the refusal of this application.

Planning. S/2012/902/FUL 18 Church Street Maiden Bradley Full Planning Single Storey Rear Extension

The Parish Council agreed to support the application.

We have received the following about the Bradley Estate September event -

To the Villagers of Maiden Bradley

I am writing first to apologize for causing you alarm after having heard second hand about the proposed Treat Festival and secondly I would like to take this opportunity to explain a little more about the event. Treat Festival is a company set up by young professionals, to celebrate Performance Art and give opportunities to young acts and artists from across the country.

The proposed event is to take place on the 14th - 15th September, in the woods nr Gare Hill for 499 people over 1 day, with two nights of camping. We will be hosting 1 main stage on which we will show case 9 talented musicians and artists from around the country. The only other stage will be the Gypsy Stage, this is an acoustic stage show casing unplugged folk musicians. The rest of the event's activities will take place off the stage and will consist of walk about theatre performances.

The main stage is scheduled to close around 12 am - subject to licensing and planning - and will start at 8pm on the Friday and 4 pm on the Saturday. The 12am cut off point will see the end of amplified music. However, throughout the hours in which the main stage will be operating any houses within the proximity will be monitored carefully for any sound pollution.

The local community is one of our biggest priorities. We will be taking measures to make sure no one in the local community will be disrupted from the event and had been planning to try and devise some plans in which Maiden Bradley could also benefit - we will be charging two pounds for car parking all of which will be given to the Parish Council as well as advertise the local Pub and Village Shop to the people attending the event. Local residents will of course be given the opportunity to gain free entry to the festival and we plan to use local produce where ever possible.

I would like you all to know that this is not a money making venture; this is a festival set up by passionate young individuals wanting to provide something for our generation as well as create an innovative experience for everyone.

We apologize for the alarm we have caused but we have held back from any formal communication whilst we have been setting the ball in motion - they idea has been slowly evolving over the last 8 months.

Finally none of this has been approved by the local authorities and until you and they are happy we will not be moving any further with this event so please if you have any queries or question get in touch.

Maiden Bradley Community Village Shop – run by you, run for you

Shop Matters (it really does!!)

We were all heartened by the positive response towards the shop that was highlighted by the recent Parish Plan Survey. It therefore seems only right that we take some time to keep our loyal supporters informed of how the shop is doing. As you know, ours is a community shop and it has been saved several times by the kindness of villagers buying various issues of shares and bonds to help it through sticky patches. I am pleased to say that, after the last issue of 10 Year Bonds and a couple of interest free loans the shop is once again emerging into the sunshine. Our shelves are full, our customers tell us they can buy more of their weekly shop in there now and we are getting a few folks coming in from outlying villages where they do not have their own shop. It reminds us we are how lucky we are to still have ours. So many thanks are due to committees, volunteers and staff past and present for the fact that our shop continues to be at the heart of our community. So to keep you interested and coming through the door I thought I would explain a few things.

Staff. We currently have 3 paid members of staff: Anne Sercombe, Sam Higgins and me. Between us we are paid for 44.5 hours per week. We are now open 59 hours per week. We have a lovely band of volunteers who fill in the gaps and to an extent "double up" with paid staff in order to allow the paid person to do some ordering, pricing, putting away deliveries etc at our busiest times. We also have volunteers who help with the fruit and veg orders and display, shelf cleaning and the collection of supplies. On the paid staff side, Anne is still the general manager and I am, for want of a better way of putting it, in charge of strategy. The Committee has tasked me with bringing the shop into profit and I am trying to build on the hard work of all who have gone before me, to make that happen.

Pricing. We want more people to use our shop and to spend more when they do. To bring more people in we must have an attractive shop that is stocked with good quality everyday items that are competitively priced. Small shops tend to be overpriced because they cannot get the turnover so feel they must have a bigger margin to compensate for that. I am trying it the other way round and we are reducing some of our prices in order to give people a better deal and to increase turnover. Our lovely free-range eggs are an example of this. We have reduced the price by 50p per dozen (now £2.50) and we are now selling twice as many. Word will spread about this outstanding price and we hope new customers will come to the shop for the eggs and spend on other things too. In the meantime our loyal Maiden Bradley customers get a better deal on an everyday staple. We are also buying more price marked items. This assures people that the price they pay in Maiden Bradley is the same as they would pay in much bigger shops. We get a smaller margin on those items but if we can achieve better turnover then we arrive at a better profit anyway and our customers feel good about what they are paying. This will only work if you keep coming in, spending your hard earned cash and telling us what you want.

Stock. Stock is a surprisingly difficult area. We must stock the basics, the things that will stop you needing to go to Sainsburys! We also like a few luxury or gift items for you to treat yourselves or take to friends. We have limited shelf space and we don't want you to get bored with the same old stuff every time you come in. We are trying some different items and we respond to requests wherever possible but we really need you to keep telling us what you want to see in the shop and what you want to buy.

Please keep using the shop if you already do. If you don't currently use the shop then please come and have a look at what we can offer, we hope you will be pleasantly surprised.

I am in the shop every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon so please come and give me your thoughts on how best I can achieve my goal of making this shop not just survive but THRIVE!!

Recipe of the Month - Chicken Breasts

Ingredients:

4 chicken breasts, boned and skinned

1 small onion chopped finely

2 garlic cloves, peeled and sliced

1cm (1/2-inch) piece fresh ginger, peeled and chopped

2 tablespoons soy sauce

1 tablespoon dry sherry or white wine

5 green cardamom pods – seeds only

2 teaspoons concentrated apple juice(or clear honey)



Method

Preheat the oven to Gas mark 4/180C/350F. Remove any fat from the chicken breasts. Mix together the onion, garlic,ginger, soy sauce, sherry/wine, cardamom seeds and apple juice or honey in a bowl. Add the chicken breasts, turn the well, cover the bowl and marinate for anything between 30 minutes and 24 hours. The longer the chicken breasts are marinated, the better they taste once cooked.

Arrange a large sheet of kitchen foil in a flat baking dish and place the chicken breasts on top, making sure they do not touch each other. Pour over the marinade and fold the foil back over the chicken. Seal the edges tightly, but leave a room for a little circulation of air inside the parcel. Bake the chicken for 30 minutes. Serve the breasts with the marinade as a sauce.
