Parish Council January 2016

Local Councils Award Scheme - the Parish Council have received the prestigious award as part of the Local Council Award Scheme. It is one of only two Councils to pass in Wiltshire at present. The achievement recognises that the council achieves good practice in governance, community engagement and council improvement. Moreover, that Maiden Bradley Council goes above and beyond their legal obligations, leading their communities and continuously seeking opportunities to improve and develop even further.

The Local Council Award Scheme is a peer assessed programme that has been designed to both provide the tools and encouragement to those councils at the beginning of their improvement journeys, as well as promoting and recognising councils that are at the cutting edge of the sector. It is through the sector working together to share best practice, drive up standards and supporting those who are committed to improving their offer to their communities so that individual councils and the sector as a whole will reach its full potential.

The Chairman thanked the clerk for her hard work in compiling the evidence and in terms of the future; the council will now review ways in which it can keep on improving its offer to the local community and welcomes input from local people and partners. It was agreed that Maiden Bradley and other local councils like it are at the front line of the government's localism agenda, and are doing as much as they can to delivery services, whilst being efficient and cost-effective.

Recreational Area Update – It was approved to replace the missing items on the Hippo Springers highlighted on the ROSPA report. The cost to supply and fit replacement handles, foot holds and bolt covers to the 2 hippo Springers would be £350.00 plus VAT of £70.00. The total £420.00.

Speed indicator Device – discussed the project to date and the need for funding to support the project, re insurance, calibration and maintenance. Council noted that Warminster Town Council are to receive two machines which they will control, the Parish Council will arrange their use through Warminster Town Council who will arrange for the setting up on sites, store, action the maintenance and calibration etc. The recommendation from the Town Clerk was to make available a budget of £250.00 for a year's usage. It was agreed that the pole installation of around £100.00 also needed to be added to this budget.

Council agreed to provide the budget of £350.00 for the project; speeding is a high priority in the community and listed on the Parish Plan.

Highways: as the Highways have indicated the parish could take over services that are to be restricted in the future due to funding cuts, Councillor Angus Neish has agreed that he will action the weed killing in the parish as he holds a licence and has access to the weed killing

Litter Pick: the date for this year's litter pick will be the 5th March 2016, do pop the date in your diary it is the weekend highlighted for the countrywide project Clean for the Queen's birthday. More details will follow.

If any Parishioner sees or is aware of anything which they feel needs attention in and around the parish highways, they are requested to contact Wiltshire Council using either the online website, the Wiltshire Council App or on the landline number 0300 456 0105.

Precept: The projects that are required for the 2016/2017 period within the parish were discussed. The noticeboards renovation, the provision of weed killing, provision of a Speed Indicator Device and pole, the review of the recreational area following the swimming pools removal. It was noted that £1170.00 had been spent on the play area fencing this financial year (Councillors had actioned some of the work required and saved the budget a cost of £250.00) this had not been budgeted for as the swimming pools removal had not been expected when the previous years budget had been set. It was agreed that the funds needed to be replaced in the Risk & Contingency budget; an increase in the funding for the parish news had been indicated by the news team at the parish

meeting, along with the need to provide grants to support the Village Shop, Village Hall and Groups, along with the running costs of the Council.

Council took into consideration that the Internal Auditor recommended at the previous audit that further work was required to ensure that appropriate funds are retained in the General Reserve to meet any unforeseen expense that might arise. It was agreed that the retained funds (risk & contingency funding) should be increased. The suggested phased increase was agreed of £250.00 to the £3200.00 from last year a total of £3450.00 would be actioned for the year 2016/2017.

It was agreed that £1000.00 would be set aside in grants for the community groups and clubs. The Defibrillator contract reserves were approved and £800.00 put aside under capital equipment reserves. £400.00 would be added each year so that in the next 3 year period the £1600.00 would be available for when the present contract ended.

Taking into account the above, and that the Grant received from the Government had decreased by £402.34 to £88.38, the final Precept request was approved at £13742.67 this would give a total of £13831.50. The increase of the figure for the Parish Council part of the Council tax Invoice for a band D property would therefore increase by £8.19 for the year. As Parish Councils do not have any other means of raising revenue, it was agreed that a sound budget for future planning needed to be considered and it was felt that this budget would fulfil the Parish Councils commitments for the 2016/2017 year.

Items for the next Agenda – Dates for meetings 2016/2017 and Business Continuity Plan.

Date of the next meeting- The Council agreed that Tuesday 9th February 2016 will be the date of the next Parish Council meeting.

As always, the Parish Council meeting will be open at the start with an opportunity for members of the public to ask questions or make comments on any matter. Vacancy on the Parish Council! Being a Councillor.....

What is a councillor?

councillors are elected to represent an individual geographical unit on the council, known as a ward or - parish – in Maiden Bradley it is the entire parish. They are generally elected by the public every four years, but there is a Co-option space available on the Parish Council at the moment as no Election has been called for in the parish.

What do councillors do?

councillors have three main components to their work.

1. Decision making - Through meetings and attending committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented.

2. *Monitoring* - councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.

3. Getting involved locally - As local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. These responsibilities and duties often depend on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available, and may include:

Going to meetings of local organisations such as the Rural Police Neighbourhood Tasking Group

Going to meetings of bodies affecting the wider community (The Warminster Area Board)

Taking up issues on behalf of members of the public

How much time does it take up?

Quite often councillors say that their duties occupy them for about an hour a week. Obviously there are some councillors who spend more time than this - and some less, but in the main, being a, parish councillor is an enjoyable way of contributing to your community, and helping to make it a better place to live and work.

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On the Buses!

Wiltshire Council has launched a public consultation on the future of the bus services that they currently support. Set against a backdrop of a big reduction in overall funding for council services, they have put forward a number of options aimed at saving money from the supported buses budget, and are asking for your view on these.

What are we facing?

- Almost all Wiltshire evening, Sunday and Bank Holiday bus services set to disappear.

- Withdrawal of many rural bus services.

- Interurban and town bus services to be drastically reduced.

or a "Nuclear" Option 6 which could leave vast swathes of the county without any bus services.

These Council plans could bring local bus operators to the brink of collapse and there is not enough capacity for community transport to plug gaps. Fortunately though, there is an alternative. As part of our research work on devolution for Wiltshire and Swindon, we have put forward a Bus Franchising proposal which will avoid the wide-ranging service cuts that would inevitably follow from adopting the consultation questionnaire options, whilst protecting and laying the foundations for the future improvement of the Wiltshire bus network. The Westminster Government have designed their devolution plans so that it would be easier for local authorities to introduce Bus Franchising, the existing legislation for which is known as Quality Bus Contracts.

We are calling this "option 24/7" because it looks at people's requirements all day, every day first ... more details at <u>http://option247.uk</u>, plus an FAQ document, and a link to the Council's consultation.

Bus Franchising offers

- A network that involves YOU and your community far more, genuinely working to serve your interests and shaped by your travel needs.

- A network that opens the way for simple affordable bus fares.

- A network that is better thought through, with less duplication and more journey opportunities.

- A network that is more easily linked with other modes such as rail, making your onward journeys easier and helping to encourage the greater use of public transport overall.

- A network with reinvigorated operators making a fair, secure income through working together to provide a better overall service for you.

 A network that is solid, robust, efficient, and able to deliver the savings that Wiltshire Council require WITHOUT massive service cuts, giving you the security of knowing that your bus service is safe, and available when you need it.
 A network that through innovation strives to always be fit for purpose, and fit

for future challenges and expansion.

Senior figures at Wiltshire Council have informed us that Bus Franchising can be included in the devolution proposals, but only if we can demonstrate strong public support for the idea. Therefore, we need your help as follows when you answer the questionnaire:

The Birth of Iwan - Melanie Collins

Iwan James was born at 5:56pm on Sunday 6th December, weighing 7lb15oz. Christian is an incredibly proud big brother! Iwan was actually born in our living room (as planned!) - we wondered how many other babies had been born in this house, and in this village. We'd love to know of any other Maiden Bradley home births.

I had a really unpleasant experience in hospital when Christian was born in 2012 - he was born with forceps in a room full of people flapping and bright lights. In the three years since his birth, I'd read a lot about home birth and felt that staying at home would be the best thing I could do to avoid a repeat. My plan nearly had to change in September, when I was told I had 'borderline' gestational diabetes; which increased the risk of the baby becoming excessively large and becoming difficult to birth, and of its blood sugar dropping after the birth. However, I monitored my blood sugar at home three times a day and was able to keep it within the target range by being careful with my diet. I noticed that carbohydrates had less of an effect on my blood sugar if I ate them with some protein or fat... So I got through a lot of eggs and nuts! The consultant was never happy for me to have the baby at home, but I felt I was making a well-informed choice, and my midwife was supportive of me regardless of that choice. So when my waters broke at 4:30am, there was no rushing around to get to hospital - I just stayed downstairs and had some porridge. The midwife I'd seen through my pregnancy initially came to the house, but had to leave as she'd worked all night, and she was replaced by another wonderful midwife from the Frome birthing unit.

I'd had five 1:1 Hypnobirthing sessions during the pregnancy. I'm not particularly good at being calm but with a lot of practice I was able to switch off my internal chatter. The classes weren't really about getting yourself into a trance (or pretending to be a chicken in labour!) but involved a lot of discussion about the processes that happen during birth, and the need to feel secure and calm. We were also taught to use visualisations and to change the way we spoke about things, so I referred to contractions as surges. All of the practice paid off, and I felt completely calm through the entire birth. There was one point towards the end where the baby's heart rate dropped. There was still no second midwife as there had been a lot of other births that day, and our midwife knew that there was a small chance she would need to resuscitate the baby and therefore needed a second person - so Liam had to call 999 and give a reason of 'respiratory distress'. Soon after that, we had four paramedics in the house - luckily three staved in the kitchen and just one was in the living room. The Hypnobirthing kept me completely focused on myself and the baby and I didn't feel at all concerned.

Unsurprisingly, the baby eventually made his way out. We didn't find out beforehand what 'variety' we were having, and I loved being passed 'my baby' - still the same baby I'd known for the past 9 months and then finding out that this baby was a boy after holding him for a few minutes. We sat on the sofa for a few hours before he was weighed, and once everything was finished and his blood sugar had been checked (it was fine) we went to bed.

Having Iwan at home, calmly and with no drugs, was at the same time incredible and the most powerful thing I'd ever experienced, and something that 'just happened' - I was very aware that I'd done something that billions of other women have done before and it wasn't panicked or shouty or scary. I just wish I'd had Christian at home as well!



<u>Lent</u>

In the Christian calendar, this is a 40 day period of penitence and self-discipline beginning on 'Ash Wednesday' and ending with the service on Holy Saturday which marks the start of Easter. Sundays falling within this period are not counted as part of Lent but as days of normality, or even celebration, notably Mothering Sunday. In medieval times, the rules of fasting were severe on weekdays, meat, milk products, and eggs were all forbidden, and only one meal a day could be eaten: marriages could not be celebrated, and couples were expected to refrain from dancing and entertainment.

After the Reformation observing Lent as a matter of personal piety persisted, in milder forms, in the High Church sections of Anglicanism. The Victorian growth of Anglo-Catholicism, and the influx of Irish immigrants, made the concept very familiar; most people are now aware that 'giving something up for Lent' is appropriate, even if they do not do it themselves.

Tomato Soup with Garlic Bread

Ingredients

For the garlic butter

- 1 garlic bulb
- 500ml/18fl oz double cream
- salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1 large bunch <u>basil</u>, roughly chopped, 2 sprigs reserved

For the tomato soup

- 75ml/21/2fl oz extra virgin olive oil
- ¹/₂ banana <u>shallot</u>, finely chopped
- 2 x 400g/14oz tin San Marzano tomatoes
- 1 small <u>baguette</u>, cut lengthways into 4 pieces

Preparation method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 170C/340F/Gas 31/2
- 2. Wrap the whole garlic bulb in aluminium foil and place on a tray in the oven. Roast for 40-45 minutes, or until soft.
- 3. When the garlic is cool enough to handle, cut the top off of the bulb. Squeeze out all the garlic and finely chop.
- 4. Pour the double cream into the bowl of a freestanding mixer and beat for 3-5 minutes, or until the mixture turns to solid fatty lumps with a liquid base.
- 5. Line a colander with a clean muslin cloth and place it over a bowl. Tip the mixture into the colander and wrap the muslin tightly around the cream. Squeeze out all the liquid so that you have a solid mass of butter in the muslin, then discard the liquid.
- 6. Tip the butter into the bowl, add the chopped garlic and a generous pinch of salt. Stir in a third of the chopped basil and mix once more.
- 7. Heat a large frying pan or sauté pan until hot, add all but two tablespoons of the extra virgin olive oil and the shallot and gently fry for a minute.
- 8. Add the tinned tomatoes and the rest of the basil, reserving two sprigs for garnish, then simmer for 2-3 minutes.
- While the soup simmers, heat a griddle pan until very hot and char the bread on both sides, then slather with the garlic butter and place in the oven to warm through.
- 10. Blend the soup using a stick blender or a food processor until you have a fine pureé. Season, to taste, with salt and black pepper.
- 11. Serve the soup in bowls with the reserved olive oil drizzled over the top and a scattering of basil leaves, and the garlic bread alongside.

Local children join a worldwide celebration.

"The children all enjoyed making their own Christingle and even their younger brothers and sisters joined in" said Academy Principal Karen Brooker.

The children each carried their Christingle to St. Martin's Church where together with their parents and staff of Whitesheet Academy they all sang 'Sing Christingle' and 'Shine Jesus Shine'. "The children from year five and six read a poem about Christingle and then Floyd, a year six pupil, read a prayer just before the Christingle were lit for the children. Mrs Brooker said "The children enjoyed the lighting of their Christingle candles and particularly appreciated having their parents attend the worship. It is always a special service and the support of the parents who attended is much appreciated".
