MAIDEN BRADLEY COMMUNITY SHOP

YOUR CHOICE!

Inserted into this month's magazine is a small leaflet explaining how and why our shop was set up as a 'community' shop. Please read it as many newcomers to the village are probably unaware of its history and why it exists. Maiden Bradley was a pioneer in Community Shops.

The leaflet explains how much it costs per month just to keep the shop open without selling anything. Over the years these overheads have been reduced to the minimum possible. Over recent months our sales have gone below our target figure of £10,000. The winter months are proving very difficult due to the absence of the passing trade which is a life line for us in the summer.

The shop offers services which people come to the shop for and often take for granted but unless people actually shop we will not be able to continue for much longer. One popular service we offer is newspapers but the shop hardly makes any profit on them due to the very low margin given by the suppliers. Tobacco and cigarettes offer no profit. So sales of these items alone do not keep the shop profitable

The main and most important service we offer is giving a home to the Post Office which, as you will read in the leaflet, does not pay us rent or costs. If its customers could buy something from the shop then that would be very beneficial.

The question we now ask is '***Does the village want to keep its shop?***' On-line shopping from supermarkets has changed the pattern of buying. The fact that we are 6 miles from any supermarket with virtually no public transport is not maybe as important a factor as it was in 2001 when the village 'saved the shop'. Perhaps the village shop has had its day and it is not needed.

Sue has been working very hard to stock the shop with goods which are asked for. She adapts and changes regularly. Sue has more ideas for the months ahead which could attract more passing trade and help local businesses but she cannot work miracles. Her purchasing ability depends on sales. Unless the people living in the village and the surrounding areas make a conscious

decision to buy regularly some items from the shop then we will have no alternative but to close. I think most people would agree that it would be a very sad day to see this happen.

Please think about this as the shop is in a precarious position. We will be having a meeting at the end of March at our AGM when we will have to make a decision.

Maybe there are some people who feel so passionately about keeping our shop that they would like to join the Management Committee. Fresh faces and fresh ideas are welcome and needed. Please get in touch if you are interested.

We want to keep the shop open and will work hard to keep it open so please help us to do so. The choice is yours.

Councillor Resignation

Councillor Jerry Rayner has given his resignation to the Parish Council. In accordance with Section 89(3) of the Local Government Act 1972, where the vacancy occurs within six months before the day on which the councillor whose office is vacant would regularly have retired, an election shall not be held under Section 89(1) of the above Act, and the vacancies will be filled at the next ordinary election of councillors on Thursday 4 May 2017.

The Parish Council have chosen to fill the vacancy by co-option for the period until that election.

Parish Steward Scheme – The Parish Steward has been informed that the following requires attention: Stourhead end of the parish the bridge requires clearing and the water drained as water is pooling, the debris removed from the traffic calming islands and the new High Street sign put up, when it arrives.

If any Parishioner sees or is aware of anything which they feel needs attention in and around the parish highways, they are requested to contact Wiltshire Council using either the online website, the Wiltshire Council App or on the landline number 0300 456 0105.

Precept Budget 2017/2018

The precept is a balancing figure; the calculation comes from the preparation of the planned expenditure and income. This then produces the planned precept figure.

The Council in calculating the precept required, considered the below:

- Next year's expenditure, including an allowance for contingencies;
- Outstanding expenditure incurred in previous years;
- Expenditure likely to be incurred before the precepted sum becomes available
- Payment to financial reserves. Local Government Finance Act 1972 s 49A (added by the Localism Act 2011)

It was agreed to set the Precept at £14341.78 a 1.98 % increase on last year's request. This would be an increase for the whole year on a band A of £1.38 Band B £1.61 Band C £1.84 band D £2.07 band E £2.53 Band F £2.99 Band G 3.45 Band H £4.14.

- £1000.00 would be set aside for the Community Grant Funding.
- £1200.00 would be set aside for the defibrillator replacement.
- £2000.00 would be set aside to repaint the Play area Tobac unit.
- £250.00 be set aside for the SID programme.
- £1000.00 would be set aside for Wiltshire Council Election costs

Items for the next Agenda: Grounds Tender, Register of Interests updated and Best Kept Village Competition.

Date of the next meeting- The Council agreed that Tuesday 7th February 2017 would be the date of the next Parish Council meeting.

As always, the Parish Council meeting will be open at the start with an opportunity for members of the public to ask questions or make comments on any matter. Sweet Potato and Carrot Soup

Ingredients

500g sweet potatoes peeled and cut into chunks
300g carrots peeled and cut into chunks
3 tbsp olive oil
2 onions finely chopped
2 garlic cloves, crushed
1litre vegetable stock
100ml crème fraîche, plus extra to serve



Method

Heat oven to 220C/200C fan/ gas 7 and put the sweet potatoes and carrots into a large roasting tin, drizzled with 2 tbsp olive oil and plenty of seasoning. Roast the veg in the oven for 25-30 mins or until caramelised and tender.

Meanwhile, put the remaining 1 tbsp olive oil in a large deep saucepan and fry the onion over a medium-low heat for about 10 mins until softened. Add the garlic and stir for 1 min before adding the stock. Simmer for 5-10 mins until the onions are very soft, then set aside.

Opening Maiden Bradley Parish Church's Ladies Working Party annual Christmas Bazaar in the Village Hall on Tuesday, Lady Susan Seymour said that they would remember that this time last year the Church seemed to be covered in nothing but tarpaulin. There was great joy when the work was over and they were back there just in time for Easter. The net proceeds totalled £125. Lady Susan was presented with a bouquet by little Julie Cave.

The vicar, the Rev J M Wright, said the restoration of the Church had cost £3,600 and they now owed £794. They had had a loan from the Diocesan Board of Finance of £500 to be repaid at £100 a year.

There followed a surprise presentation of a basket of fruit to Mrs R Luff under whose leadership, the working party has been meeting fortnightly at her home for many years. Lady Susan made the presentation. The working party who were responsible for the sale, have recently given £500 towards the cost of the restoration work.






