Vacancy on the Parish Council! Being a Councillor

What is a councillor? Councillors are elected to represent an individual geographical unit on the council, known as a ward or - parish – in Maiden Bradley it is the entire parish. They are generally elected by the public every four years, but there is a Co-option space available on the Parish Council at the moment as no Election has been called for in the parish.

What do councillors do? Councillors have three main components to their work.

1. Decision making - Through meetings and attending committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented.

2. *Monitoring* - Councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.

3. Getting involved locally - As local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. These responsibilities and duties often depend on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available, and may include:

- •Going to meetings of local organisations such as the Rural Police Neighbourhood Tasking Group
- •Going to meetings of bodies affecting the wider community (The Warminster Area Board)
- •Taking up issues on behalf of members of the public

How much time does it take up? Quite often councillors say that their duties occupy them for about an hour a week. Obviously there are some councillors who spend more time than this - and some less, but in the main, being a, parish councillor is an enjoyable way of contributing to your community, and helping to make it a better place to live and work.

Parish Council 11th December 2012

Chairman's announcements- The Chairman distributed a booklet to each Councillor giving them the provisional dates for the Elections in May 2013. The important dates to note are: Publication of the Notice of Elections – Tuesday 26 March 2013; receipt of nominations - Friday 5 April 2012; and, the last date for Registration - Wednesday 17 April 2012. The first meeting of the new Council would take place on the 14th May 2012. If any parishioners are interested in becoming a Councillor please contact the Clerk or one of the Councillors. You can make a difference in your parish by being on the team.

Dispensations- the Government has recently changed the law regarding the interests of Parish & Town Councillors. To enable them to lawfully set the Precept figure for 2013/2014 they were required to discuss and approve a dispensation for each member to act. The Council discussed the dispensations for Councillor Angus Neish, Councillor Ben Gunstone, Councillor Sarah Fry, Councillor Patrick Nixon, Councillor Franck Baudrain and Councillor Jerry Rayner. The Parish Council agreed to approve the dispensation of those Councillors listed for a year, for the reason of setting of the precept. This then makes it lawful for them to make the decision. It is hoped that the government will take action to address this issue in the near future. If Parishioners have any questions regarding this matter please contact the Clerk.

Planning - S/2012/1626 Location: Grange Farm Maiden Bradley Warminster. Proposal: Remove 130 Metres of hedgerow as per map. Listed Building: Conservation Area. Resolved: Approved the application

S/2012/1686 Location: High View High Street Maiden Bradley Warminster. Proposal: Fell x 12 leylandii and crown unknown species to reduce height and improve shape and maintain trunk. Resolved: Approved the application.

(In planning matters the Council acts as a consultee of the principal authority, so it is Wiltshire Council that makes the decision.)

Maiden Bradley Estate Wood Burner - The Parish Council had noted the report received back from Fleur De Rhe Philipe on the issues highlighted at the last meeting. The Clerk was instructed to thank her for her intervention. The Parish Council felt that it should be noted that the estate should be commended for its swift response to the noise issues. Council would await news from Enforcement that they had finally closed the issue.

Parish Steward- The Parish Council asked the Clerk to inform the Parish Steward that from Yarnfield, left turn towards Kilmington Church, past the Farm towards Grange Farm the first part of the lane is covered in mud and debris and might need attention. There is a need to be watchful of the gullies and grips in the parish; they need to be kept clear to help reduce surface water flooding this winter. If you see any other areas in the Parish that need clearing of mud and debris, if channels require cutting through the verges to let surface water clear or if there are small pot holes that need filling in, please do not hesitate to contact the Parish Clerk or Clarence at Wiltshire Council. Parishioners can help the Council identify such issues and get them repaired swiftly.

Project to install a Heart Defibrillator -Council asked the Clerk to invite Richard Schofield from the Community Heart Beat Trust to a Parish Council meeting to discuss the involvement and costs for placing a defibrillator in the parish for parishioners use in an emergency. Parishioners are asked to note that if they are interested in the Parish Council taking on such a project in the Community and they would support it, that they are encouraged to come to the start of the meeting when he is present to join in on the debate. The date of the meeting he will attend will be advertised in the next Parish News issue.

Tonne Salt Bag Scheme – It was agreed to purchase a grit bin for £145.00. The Clerk was instructed to find out from Wiltshire Council as to when the order of salt would be delivered. The Clerk would contact the Somerset Arms to arrange delivery and the siting of the Grit Bin. The grit salt would be used for the footpaths and road down Church Street or anywhere that was deemed necessary to enable parishioners to access services in the bad weather.

Consultation Speed limits increased for HGVs over 7.5tonnes –Council agreed to respond to the consultation and request their support for the speed limit to stay as it is for lorries. The Clerk was instructed to reply on behalf of the Parish Council that given the village is in an area of AONB, there is no need to increase the speed limit which affect small rural parishes even more with speeding.

Items for the next Agenda - Precept

Date of the next meeting. The Council agreed that the 8th January 2013 would be the date of the next Parish Council meeting. As always, the Parish Council meeting will be open at the start with an opportunity for members of the public to ask questions or make comments on any matter.

Christmas in Afganistan

This is my last article, as I will be home mid-January at my $5\frac{1}{2}$ month point, slightly earlier than envisaged, as luckily my job has come to a natural end. I am very much looking forward to some leave in Maiden Bradley before I start my next job.

This month has passed quickly getting work done before our UK counterparts departed for Christmas leave. We have also had a number of VIP visits, including Her Royal Highness Princess Anne and the Prime Minister. Sadly, I didn't meet either, but I know their visits were well received.

On the run up to Christmas the Adjutant General's Corps' (AGC) band visited us again and Camp Bastion formed its own military choir. The highlight for me was Christmas Eve, when we met en masse outside the cookhouse for non-alcoholic mulled wine (which tasted remarkably like hot Ribena – other brands are available!) and a warm mince pie. I have been told that approximately 1,000 soldiers attended, many wearing Father Christmas hats with their uniform and holding glow sticks. We then walked to the vigil site for a carol service lead by our Padres and accompanied by the AGC brass band and our choir. I can honestly say I have never heard carols sung with such enthusiasm before and the memory will stay with me for a long time. I also very much enjoyed attending Midnight Mass.

On Christmas Day we were allowed a late start, although a fire alarm in my accommodation block put an end to the planned lay-in. My roommate and I opened Christmas presents together and then watched a film on a laptop. We chose Salmon Fishing in Yemen, which it turns out was the perfect choice, as it is a feel good film, which I can thoroughly recommend. Apparently the book is worth a read – I may well suggest it to the Book Club when I get back. We then had an excellent Christmas lunch with our colleagues and the cookhouse did us proud with turkey and all the trimmings, followed by Christmas pudding. The afternoon was filled with more carol singing (our own version of the 12 days of Christmas) and Christmas presents delivered by Father Christmas from UK4U, a charity which gives every service person on operations a tin filled with useful gifts.

I am now preparing for my final trips to Lashkar Gah and Kabul and will then start to pack up my room for my return via 24 hours in Cyprus to 'decompress', which is the Army term for letting your hair down and normalising before returning to the UK.

On a final note, I wanted to thank Carolyn and the team at KiwiKate in Maiden Bradley who very kindly sent me some luxury merino wool and possum socks, as they read in my last article that I was after some bed socks. They are gorgeous and I can thoroughly recommend them to anyone who also suffers from cold feet!

I look forward to seeing everyone in the village soon. I hope you all had a lovely Christmas and I wish everyone a healthy and happy New Year.

Maiden Bradley Community Village Shop - run by you, run for you

Recipe - Smoked Haddock Risotto with Chives

750g naturally smoked haddock 1 bay leaf 1 litre cold water 75g butter 1 small onion 300g risotto rice 300ml dry white wine 1/2tbsp. Dijon mustard 2tbsp freshly grated Parmesan cheese, plus extra to serve 2tbsp crème fraiche 2 tbsp chives

Serves 4.

Place the fish in a pan that can accommodate it in a single layer. Add bay leaf, water and 25g butter. Simmer gently for about 10 minutes until just cooked. Lift the fish on to a plate to cool. Discard the bay leaf. Pour the liquid into a saucepan and keep just below boiling point. Finely chop the onion. Melt 25g butter in a sauté pan. Stir in the onion and cook gently for about 8 minutes until soft but uncoloured. Stir the unwashed rice into the onion and cook for a couple of minutes until all the grains are covered in butter. Add the wine and simmer until reduced by half. Stir in the mustard and add a ladleful of the hot fish water. Cook , stirring constantly until absorbed into the rice. Continue until all the liquid is used up and the rice is creamy but still retains a bite in the centre. Flake the cooled fish off skin and bones in bite-sized chunks. Stir crème fraiche and 2 tbsp Parmesan into the risotto, followed by the flaked fish and any remaining juices. Cover the pan, turn off the heat and leave for 5 minutes. Give a final stir, adding the last of the butter and freshly snipped chives. Serve dredged with Parmesan.


Santa's Tour






