You will have seen the formal announcement of the Shop AGM in last month's news. I would just like to add that I would really like to see many of you at the meeting. After the formalities we will have an Open Forum with refreshments where you can put forward your thoughts and ideas about the shop. The shop is *community led and run* and so we need your input to make it a worthwhile and successful village amenity. The committee has ideas but what are your ideas?

The Management Committee of the Shop at present comprises 7 members:

Liz Nixon (Chairman), Mike Perry (Treasurer), Alan Brierley (Book Keeper), Philip Henry, Melanie Keogh (Secretary), Catherine Spencer, and Amanda Dye (Manager). Mike Perry will be standing down as he is shortly leaving the village. The Management Committee is allowed under the shop constitution to have up to 8 members. We therefore have space for more committee members and I would very much welcome people to come forward to join us. In practice all members of the committee stand down at the AGM and put themselves up again for re-election if they wish to.

The Management Committee meets roughly every 8 weeks and its role is to look at the bigger picture and think strategically about the shop's future. It ensures that the shop is financially sound and all necessary legal requirements are in place. All the day to day decisions are taken by the Manager and so a committee member does not get bogged down with the nitty gritty and deciding on the price of a loaf of bread!

Nomination papers for the committee are in the shop and have to be filled in and returned to me not less than 7 days before the AGM date.

Parish Council 11th February 2014

Defibrillator Project- the Parish Council wishes to thank all those parishioners who have sent in their pledge envelopes this month. The village shop would be very pleased to receive any donations to pass onto the Clerk. If you wish to pay directly by BACS for ease the bank details for the Parish Council using direct transfer are **Lloyds Bank Market Place Warminster Sort code 309913 Account number 07052153.** If you could use Defibrillator and your surname as a coding the Clerk will then be able to identify the payment. A totalizer has been placed in the Village Shop window to show where the project funding has reached. The Parish Council is applying for a grant from the Warminster Area Board to hopefully give further funds towards the project.

There is still a further £915.00 to raise, If you still have your letter asking for donations toward this extremely important project please do take action to help this project move forward or contact the Clerk for further details.

Parish Steward/Highways - The Clerk was instructed to contact Vicky Oates, Road Safety Officer Traffic and Network Management Wiltshire Council re a suggested new site for the SID. The Clerk would ask whether if the cost could be covered by the Parish Council that a new pole could be placed near the Frome end of the parish where the majority of the speeding occurs. This had been discussed with the Wiltshire Technical Officers on site, as their recommended course of action.

WWI Commemorations - The Clerk reported to Council that she had met with the Chairman of the Village Hall. He had put a suggestion forward that a Wooden Plaque Memorial be placed in the Village Hall garden area at the front of the Village Hall with a seat for reflection. This would give an easy accessible site for all denominations to view and a resting place for those less able. The Clerk had also been approached by a parishioner who will feed back further ideas that they are investigating at present. The Clerk informed Councillors that other parishes have indicated that they will use the month of November for their Commemorations; this was noted.

Litter Pick - The 2014 Community Litter pick will take place from the Community Garden, on the 22nd March 2014 starting at 10.00am. Councillors will co-ordinate handing out bags and equipment on the morning from the Community Garden. Councillor Angus Neish will use his trailer to collect the full litter bags and return them to the Community Garden. A list will be placed in the village shop to take names of attendees coming to the litter pick. If you are able to help please do add your name to the list in the village shop or contact the Clerk direct so that equipment can be arranged.

Neighbourhood Watch – There is a vacancy for the post of Neighbourhood Watch Representative for the parish. If you would be interested in taking on this post not only representing the Community but helping coordinate issues from the rural policing unit to all please seek further information.. The Rural Policing unit have one meeting every 3 months in Bishopstrow Village Hall with the other representatives in the area. It is a very friendly meeting with everyone working together. They have an email warning system re incidents in the area and it can be a very rewarding position. Do get in touch with your local Councillor, the Clerk or take a look at http://www.ourwatch.org.uk/for more details on Neighbourhood Watch.

Swimming Pool – The Trustees and members of the Parish Council would like to ask the Parishioners in the community if anyone is interested in taking on the Swimming Pool as a Lead Volunteer of a Group; to get in touch contact either one of the Trustees, your local Parish Councillor or the Parish Clerk. Two parishioners willing to help have come forward so far. It was agreed that there will be a six month period from December whereby if no one comes forward the future of

the pool will be re discussed at the May Parish Council meeting and the possible disposal of the pool will be implemented. There is now only three months left.

Items for the next Agenda: ¼ year Budget check, Annual Parish Meeting Arrangements, Asset Register Review/Risk Assessment update and Annual Litter Pick to finalise any last minute arrangements.

Date of the next meeting- The Council agreed that Tuesday 11th March 2014 would be the date of the next Parish Council meeting. As always, the Parish Council meeting will be open at the start with an opportunity for members of the public to ask questions or make comments on any matter. 
Welcome Club

Recipe

This a cross between a burger and a fishcake but with a twist.

4 skinless salmon fillets, cubed. 1-2 tbsp Thai green curry paste

200g quinoa

Large bunch fresh coriander, coarsely chopped

2 cloves garlic, finely chopped

Juice of 2 limes, plus wedges to serve

150g edamame beans olive oil for frying.

Place the salmon, garlic, curry paste and half the lime juice in a food processor, season with salt and process into a smooth, mince-like texture. Remove the mixture, divide in half, and, using your hands, form 4 burger – patty shapes. Set aside in the fridge to firm up slightly.

Place the quinoa in a pan, cover with boiling water and simmer for 10-15 minutes, or until just tender. Drain and stir in the edamame beans, remaining lime juice and coriander and season with salt and pepper. Stir well and set aside.



Heat a little olive oil in a frying pan, add the salmon burgers and fry for 5 minutes on each side.

Place some quinoa in the centre of each plate. Place the burger on top, garnish with a sprig of coriander and a lime wedge.



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
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
