Parish Council 9th April 2013

Housing Survey- the Housing Survey is being delivered with this edition of the Parish News. The Parish Council would be most grateful if parishioners could take some time to complete the survey. It will give accurate figures as to whether there is a need for affordable housing in the parish.

Community Litter Pick-The Chairman thanked Councillor Franck Baudrain for organising the event and all of the parishioners who had given their time that day to help improve the appearance of the parish; their help was much appreciated.

It was agreed that there was a requirement for more people to be involved next year as a few areas had not been covered because of a lack of volunteers. It was agreed that more thought should be put into advertising the event next year, possibly larger posters actioned earlier in the year to advertise the event. There was a need for more involvement working with the Community Shop. The previous organiser had targeted help through the shop in previous years and this would need further discussion with the Shop Committee. It was mentioned that word of mouth works best with all community events and that if parishioners were informed that, if everyone could just do ½ an hour, it would be appreciated and make a difference.

Parishioners are asked to note that the Best Kept Village Competition Judging is to take place in late May early June.

Parish Steward/Highways- it was reported to the Clerk that the traffic islands in Church Street need clearing out and that the drains are blocked in the centre of the village. Before the entrance to the village there is a deep rut about five yards long by the first layby down near Dunkerton on the B3092 by the sharp turn. This road surface is extremely poor and is causing issues for motorbikes. The Clerk was instructed to inform the Highways of this. Recreational Area Moles – The Clerk has been asked to call out the Mole Catcher as the recreational area has mole hills again in the children's play area and could be a trip hazard. The Risk Assessment check sheet had highlighted it as an issue.

Forces March- Council agreed that the recreational area can be used by the Forces March Group subject to the usual agreements in place. The Clerk was instructed to contact Michael Massy-Beresford with the relevant documentation.

Youth Club & Swimming Pool Area- Councillor Ben Gunstone reported to Council on the Youth Club's activities. The Football Club are looking into grants for developing the old Youth Club Hut area for changing rooms for the Teams.

It had been highlighted to Council by the Trustees that despite trying to get people to run the pool and various people having shown interest, to-date no one is prepared to do anything. Therefore, if no one is prepared to come forward and run the pool, the trustees will have no option but to fill in the pool and return the ground to recreation use.

The Clerk was instructed to email the Trustees and inform them that the Parish Council have no objection to filling in the Swimming Pool.

Section 137 Expenditure: limit for 2013 -14 LGA 1972 s137- Council noted that the Department for Communities and Local Government has confirmed that the appropriate sum for parish councils in England for the purposes of section 137(4) (a) of the Local Government Act 1972 ("the 1972 Act") for 2013-2014 is £6.98 per head of the electorate and that this gives the Parish Council £1717.08 to lawfully grant under Section 137 if it wishes. The Parish Council had set its budget at £1000.00 for the coming financial year.

Warminster Area – Our Community Matters Website- Wiltshire Council have set up a new internet site for the communities within the area. It is a blog to advertise what's going on in and around the area, along with the provision for advertising for volunteers, job vacancies etc. Groups and Clubs in the parish are encouraged to use it. It is easy to use and parishioners just need to ask to be registered on the site and then they can use it as much or as little as they wish. The Clerk is happy to help anyone who would like assistance with using the site.

Items for the next Agenda: Election of the Chairman and Vice Chairman, a Review of Parish Council Documentation and Clerks Appraisal. The Clerk was also instructed to invite the PCSO to the Annual Parish Meeting to give a report.

Date of the next meeting- The Council agreed that the 14th May 2013 would be the date of the next Parish Council meeting. **The Annual Parish Meeting will start at 7.30pm followed by the Annual Parish Council meeting at 8.00pm. All are welcome to attend.** As always, the Parish Council meeting will be open at the start with an opportunity for members of the public to ask questions or make comments on any matter. 

Welcome Club





Mackerel Baked with Yoghurt and Cream

Fish is good for you especially oily fish which is excellent for the heart. Mackerel is a very good example of the type of oily fish we should eat despite the presence of cream in this dish! If it makes you feel better use low fat yoghurt.



4 medium-sized mackerel cleaned
1 (5 fl oz) carton natural yoghurt
4 tablespoons fresh double cream
Salt and pepper
Lemon wedges
Watercress

Preheat the oven to 190°C

Wash the mackerel; dry well and place in an oven-proof dish

Beat the yoghurt and cream together. Season to taste and pour over the fish. Bake for 15-20 minutes until the fish is cooked through.

Serve garnished with watercress and lemon wedges.

All the ingredients are available from Maiden Bradley Village Shop. The fish is to order only through the Shop.

From Behind the Counter

April was an interesting month with the introduction of fresh fish to order every week and the trial of some new bread over the Easter Weekend. Turnover is still buoyant and in March there was another small excess of income over expenditure in spite of having to call out the engineers to the freezer (yet again).

Fresh Fish. We are now offering a new service of fresh fish supplied to order every week. The fish comes from Bridport and the company's strapline is "24 hours from port to plate" so you can be assured it is very fresh. At the time of writing we have had only one fresh fish order but the feedback on the quality of the fish was very encouraging. Inevitably there will be some teething troubles in the ordering system but bear with us and I am sure we will soon have a system that makes it easy for the customers, us and the suppliers. The company also supplies shellfish, smoked products such as kippers and smoked mackerel as well as fish cakes and fish soup. If you call in to the shop we can give you a full list of what can be supplied (it runs to 2 pages!) and show you how to order it.



Bread. You will know that for many years we have had available frozen bloomer loaves. Well now the same company makes wholemeal, white and harvest grain loaves in both large and small sizes. During the Easter weekend, when Taylor's were not delivering to us, we trialled the new bread and the response was mostly positive. We are constrained at the moment by freezer space but in due course we will have this bread available again for those who want it. Then I will aim to cut the Taylor's orders back so that we just have enough for the day of delivery (Mon, Wed and Fri) and on the days between we will cook our own bread. By doing this we will be able to provide fresh bread every day.

Coffee. For those of you who enjoy ground or bean coffee, we now have a new brand in the shop. "Nice" comes from the 918 coffee shop in Gillingham so we are supporting another local business. 918 now roast their own coffee and supply it bagged in either ground or whole bean form. We have the ground form in several strengths so come along and try it and let us know what you think. If you prefer whole beans then just ask and we will get it for you.

Ice Cream. Ever the optimists, we have got in the first of this season's ice cream! Sure enough, the sun has come out and sales have been steady. Our ice cream freezer is rather small but we will keep a modest range of the most popular brands. Do tell us your favourite and we will try to squeeze it in.

Saturday Staff. Many of you will already know, or by now will have met, Amanda Dye in the shop. Amanda responded to our ad for a Saturday job and she is now a fixture on the staff. Amanda lives in Horningsham and has long been a customer and loyal supporter of our shop. Many Horningsham residents regard the Maiden Bradley shop as their local shop too and we are happy to encourage that by having one of their own behind the counter. Welcome Amanda, we hope you will enjoy working in the shop.

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
