POPPY APPEAL - 2014


Many events have taken place this year to mark the centenary of the start of The Great War. So named because no other conflict had taken place on such a scale, or had such a global impact. It involved all the major nations of Europe and the World including 5 Empires with their associated colonies and commonwealth states. 59 million troops were mobilised,



over 8 million died, with over 29 million injured. The scale was unimaginable. It was supposed to be the war that ended all wars. History relates that this was not so; one hundred years later the world is still a theatre of war. One uniting factor of all conflicts are the servicemen and women who return home with both mental and physical injuries. Since 1914 much more is understood about rehabilitation. Due to The Poppy Appeal, The Royal British Legion can focus on providing facilities for recovery and to actively support all the generations affected. Your generosity in supporting the Appeal year after year makes this possible. Thank you.

The unexpected Indian Summer in September has seen plenty of pool activity for the pupils of Whitesheet Primary Academy. "We're so lucky to have this lovely heated pool at our Junior Centre in Zeals," said Academy Principal Karen Brooker. "The children are certainly getting plenty of use from it in this delightful late summer sunshine". With sport and exercise activities being an important part of the school curriculum these days the pool proves a real boon to the school – and is one of the most popular lessons!



The broad based curriculum for the academy also features music – which is unusual amongst primary schools. "As we've all seen in recent TV programmes the joy that music brings to the children is something to behold – and to begin their interest and discover their talent at the earliest possible stage of their development is so important," commented Mrs Brooker. "We find it brings the whole school together".

Whitesheet Primary became an academy almost a year ago and has recently produced its results for this first academic year. The attainment and progress of the majority of pupils was above, and in some subject well above, the national average. "It's so rewarding to see the academy moving ahead so positively – and achieving such outstanding results," said Mrs Brooker.

The academy is part of the Diocese of Salisbury Academy Trust which now comprises five local academies. The Trust has sourced funding for an on-going refurbishment programme at Whitesheet and significant changes, particularly to the Infant Centre in Kilmington, have greeted the children on their return from the summer break. "Wow!" was the succinct praise from one key stage one pupil.

Sink or Swim

Earlier in the year the Parish Council sent out a request via the Parish Minutes encouraging a villager to take a lead in reviewing the case for either the restoration or closure of the swimming pool. For those who are new to the village, the swimming pool is sited on the Recreation Ground on The Rank, Bradley Lane. Since my arrival in the village some 4 years ago the pool has been closed for use and has not been open for some time prior to my arrival.

The Trustees worked for many years keeping the asset going however in more recent times the pool failed to be an attraction and to earn sufficient revenue for administration, manning, maintenance, and improvement purposes, thus the closure.

To be party to the loss of such an asset with the risk of demolition and in-filling I decided to offer an independent assessment of the situation to see what, if anything, could be salvaged and to view the possibility of a rebuild to meet the requirements of our current lifestyles and needs.

At an open meeting at the Parish Council earlier in the year it was agreed with the representative of the Board of Trustees of the Pool, that a hold should be put on the decision to apply for planning permission to demolish the buildings and the pool before in-filling and reinstatement of the ground to a usable condition. We are now approaching the point when the moratorium will expire. However, the work required to assess the potential product has only just started.

Therefore it was agreed internally with a group of interested villagers that we should make this interim report and an appeal to extend the date for final closure and demolition for a further 24 months at least: The reasoning is as follows:

- 1) Due to neglect the site has created a home and breeding ground for invertebrates and amphibians.
- 2) The pool cannot be drained for inspection because of the above.
- 3) The colony of newts, frogs and toads have been identified through a preliminary Ecological Survey. The result of which suggests that this is a breeding ground for protected species and therefore cannot be moved without licence or the habitat interfered with, damaged or destroyed.
- 4) Therefore a full survey will need to be conducted of the eco system before any removal or in-filling can take place.
- 5) The project therefore changes initially in order to provide in proximity to the pool habitat, a new pond to where the current members of the newt community can be moved.
- 6) Therefore the creation of a Wetland Habitat will take up to two years to mature before any movement by a licenced authority can be planned.
- 7) The wanton act of the destruction of a wildlife habitat may be considered criminal and therefore venturing to infill the swimming pool would be unwise. Therefore it may be appropriate to consider seeking further advice on the matter.
- 8) The group forming to redevelop the site are advised not to take responsibility as a Trustee of the existing organisation.

Initially the plan would be to provide a pond or pools, custom built for these little creatures. Then redevelop the site to construct a worthwhile swimming, fitness and recreational centre for this village. It seems that a grant for the work to be done may be obtainable, but work done would have to be in accordance with guidelines in order to provide the necessary garden/parkland/wetland to be constructed. This would provide interest for us all in the community and a place of outdoor experience for students of ecology.

We have within the group, the skills to provide the planning and development of the wetland facility. Adequate funds and some muscular determination are required to provide an end result, sooner rather than later with approval of the landowners and the planning authorities.

Guide Dog Gabbie

Gabbie has changed a lot since I wrote the piece for last month's MBPN. She is now 14 weeks old and is definitely changing from a puppy to a small version of her grown up self. This does not mean she is no longer cute, she still has an adoring public everywhere we go.

Gabbie had her second set of vaccinations this last month and so now we can go anywhere and she can walk on the pavement and in public places. This is just as well as she is now a very wriggly 10.5 kg and carrying her is not something I like to do too much of!

Since my last piece Gabbie has made several trips to a shopping mall and also to Sainsburys where she managed to embarrass me with two puddles. Luckily I go everywhere equipped for mopping and picking up. I am conscious that any complaints could affect not only us but the Guide Dog Association too.

We are privileged to be able to go to places with the trainee puppies that other dogs are not permitted and we have to take every step not to abuse this acceptance that the pups have to learn somewhere. Once she was vaccinated we could start to expand Gabbie's world. I was confident that her response to the crowds in the mall would mean she would cope in town so our first real town time was a trip to Bideford. This proved no problem so we went to a quietish local train station to look at some train movements and people and luggage etc. Just outside the train station was a busy bus stop and we sat there for a while watching buses coming and going and getting used to the sound of air breaks and doors opening and closing. She was quickly at ease with all of that so we ventured onto the last bus that came before we had to leave. The driver was amenable to us just getting on the bus, having a look around and getting off again.

The next steps are to get on and off a train and travel a couple of stops on a bus.

In addition to her socialisation experiences, every day we work on her understanding of the basic instructions; sit, down, stay, wait, leave and come. She is making good progress, mostly because she is incredibly greedy, so provided treats are on offer she will do pretty much anything. Lead training is proving tricky and will obviously take more time. Next week we will be meeting our puppy walking supervisor, who we have not seen for a month, and we will be able to assess Gabbie's progress.

Recipe - Pear Sorbet Serves 4

4 ripe pears 160g/ 5 1/2oz caster or icing sugar Juice of 2 lemons 1 egg white – lightly whisked

Peel, core and quarter the pears. Put the pears into a saucepan with the sugar and enough water to just cover the pears then poach gently for 20 minutes. Remove the pears and reduce the liquid by boiling quickly until thick and syrupy. Puree the pears, sugar syrup and lemon juice together in a liquidizer or food processor. Allow to cool and then freeze. When nearly frozen, fold in the egg white and freeze until firm.

What is the future for NHS services in Wiltshire?

Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group is led by local GPs. We plan and pay for the majority of NHS services that you use across the county. Over the next five years, we know that demand for NHS services in Wiltshire will continue to increase but the money we have available to spend on these services will not increase at the same rate.

Modern advances in healthcare are helping people to live for longer than ever before which is a cause for celebration. However, this does mean that the demand for NHS services from the over-65s is expected to increase significantly over the coming years. As a result, the CCG needs to adapt the way we provide NHS services so that they better meet the needs of our ageing population.

How will we meet this challenge?

The CCG has developed a Five Year Plan to enable us to respond to this challenge. Our plan sets out how we can continue to provide high quality but affordable health services in Wiltshire between now and 2019. We won't be doing it alone either. Our key partners like Wiltshire Council, GP surgeries, local hospitals and other NHS providers are vital to the success of the plan.

It will mean some major changes to the shape of health care services in Wiltshire. Our vision is that health and social care services should support and sustain independent living and as the organisation responsible for designing and commissioning those services, we are keen to make them both affordable and the best possible for local people.

Our model for the future of health care in Wiltshire is based on three key principles:

- 1. Encourage and support Wiltshire residents to take on more responsibility for their own health and wellbeing
- 2. Provide fair access to a high quality and affordable system of care for the greatest number of people
- 3. Provide less care in hospitals and more care at home or in the community

To achieve these aims we will need to change the way in which we spend our budget. We will:

- 1. Spend more money on health education and prevention to help people take more personal responsibility for their health and wellbeing
- 2. Spend more money to improve community care and increase the range of services provided in a local setting
- 3. As a result, we would need to spend proportionately less money on providing bed-based care in hospital

We are going to split Wiltshire up into 20 clusters of approximately 20,000 people. Each cluster will have an integrated team of GP surgeries, community nurses and therapists together with social worker support which will work together to ensure that we have a more joined up system of health and social care.

How can you get more involved?

The CCG has already been carrying out a wide-ranging consultation about our Five Year Plan across the county and this has included public meetings, outreach events, and presentations to a variety of organisations. You may have been involved in one of these events?

Over the next few months the CCG will be giving presentations at the 18 Area Boards across the county. Each Area Board is planning a health fair with lots of different stalls for you to visit followed by presentations from the CCG and Wiltshire Council about our plans for improving health and social care. out the date οf the Health Fair in vour please visit area www.wiltshire.gov.uk/council/areaboards/healthfairs

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
