#### **Ken Gunter**

Unfortunately the September edition of the News was already on the way to the printers when we heard the very sad news of Ken Gunter's death. Rather belatedly we would like to send our deepest sympathy to all his family. A well-attended Service was held at All Saints' Church, following earlier cremation, on 4th September. The memories of his father that Keith was able to recount gave such a wonderful picture of him that, with Keith's permission, we are printing them here as a tribute to Ken.

"Dad lived in Maiden Bradley all his life, most of his childhood spent living at Kingston Lane. He attended Maiden Bradley School and then on to Mere where he finished his education. Whilst he was still quite young his father left to fight in the war and Dad was left to look after his mother, spending much of his time helping to grow vegetables in their large garden. He often told us of


the times he spent with his friend Alex Pike catching rabbits and earning a bit of money by selling them to the American soldiers stationed nearby. If he wasn't rabbiting he would probably be up to no good with his other mates, namely Malcolm Paine and Maurice Mosley.

After leaving school he began working for Holdoways of Westbury as a painter & decorator which was to become his lifetime's career. He soon moved to Culverhouse, another local company, and then finally to Butchers of Warminster where he progressed to foreman. He was also assigned to look after the young apprentices whom I'm sure were pleased to take advantage of his experience and critical eye.

Dad was a very keen sportsman, regularly playing football and cricket for Maiden Bradley. He was also a great team player at The Somerset Arms playing both darts and skittles, winning many trophies through the years. As a young man he was a keen motorcyclist, owning a Matchless with a unique number plate – HMR 8.

Dad met Mum in the Flora Café in Frome, where she worked. After they were married they went to live at The Rank and

this was to become our family home. As the family expanded the bike was swapped for a motorbike



and sidecar and subsequently replaced by a family car. Both Dad and Mum doted on their grandchildren and loved to spoil them with many packets of sweet cakes and chocolate biscuits, often all consumed at one sitting.

In his later years Dad cared for Mum during her long illness and then soon after she passed on he was diagnosed with Alzeimers We were all determined that he should stay in his own home as long as possible and the whole family worked hard to accomplish this but inevitably he finally had to go into care and it was in Longbridge Deverill Care Home that he passed away peacefully in his sleep on August 24<sup>th</sup>".

We are sad to report the death of Amy Stook in the Fives Court, Mere, where she has been living for nearly three years. She and Reg came to live at Fourwinds, Maiden Bradley in 1991. She became a regular worshipper at All Saints' and was soon helping Mrs Condlyffe with her duties as Verger, taking over from her when they became too onerous. She was very sad when she too became unable to manage them, but continued to attend services as long as she could and then received Holy Communion at home and also in Mere when she moved there. #### Poppy Appeal 2015

I want to thank Pippa Brierley for organising the Poppy Appeal, so brilliantly, in Maiden Bradley for so many years. She has handed the baton to me this year, and I am grateful to all the collectors for agreeing to continue to help with collections. Our house to house collections are licensed to start on 24th October and continue until the 9th November. Those kindly collecting are David Morse (High Street, Frome view), Mary Stevens (The Knapp, Barcroft, the Rank and Frome Road), Diana Stevens (Church Street, Somerset Arms side), Sarah Neish (Church Street, Village shop side, outlying farms). The Village Shop will have one static point and the Somerset Arms, two.

Please remember that if you are a taxpayer and use a Gift Aid envelope, the Royal British Legion can reclaim from the Inland Revenue 25p for every £1.00 given. Over £215 was raised in this way last year. The collectors have a supply of envelopes so do please do ask for one.

#### **Recreation Consultation**

It must though be accepted that resources of the Parish Council are limited both financially and in people power. Many proposals may require funding which will need to be sought through grants. However much can be achieved by local residents working together to start new projects or maintain existing so your thoughts may help improve the quality of life enjoyed in the parish for the future generations.

C25 (Part), Kingston Lane, Bradley Lane and Whitepits, Maiden Bradley and Kingston Deverill; from its junction with B3092 Church Street, Maiden Bradley to its junction with B3095, Kingston Deverill.

To enable: BT Openreach to access underground chambers for cabling.

Alternative route: via B3092 - B3095 (Mere) and vice versa.

The closure will be clearly indicated by traffic signs and access will be maintained for residents.

This Order will come into operation on 26 October 2015 and it is anticipated that the closure will be required daily between 09:30 – 15:30 until 20 November 2015. The Order will have a maximum duration of 18 months.

With this in mind we arranged a trip out of Weymouth and invited some beginners to join us. Such trips are not for the faint hearted and you need to have watched 'One Flew Over The

Cuckoo's Nest' to appreciate the title.




We met outside the pub at 05:15 on what was a very foggy September Sunday morning and headed for our first RV at McDonalds in Weymouth (also not for the faint hearted). Our skipper for the day was Ryan Casey, a talented young international sea angler who is the youngest skipper to operate out of

Weymouth. Our first task was to catch enough Mackerel to be used as bait before heading further out to sea to get amongst the 'big stuff'.



Our target species at the first mark was to be Tope which





After a few hours at the Tope mark the tide began to run hard which made it virtu-

ally unfishable so we moved to a mark close to Portland Bill to try for some Sea Bream. During the short trip between marks we were treated to a 'swim past' by a pod of Porpoises made up of a few adults together with many young – a rare treat. However, on arrival at the Bream mark the fish were not

playing so we had another move closer to shore to try for some hard fighting Wrasse. Everybody managed to catch and return some of these sporty fish with Sarah catching a fine specimen that will qualify here for a badge from Sea Angler Magazine, not bad for a total beginner.



#### Marion and Mick's Garden

So many people have been showing an interest in the progress of our garden that Marion and Mick would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their kind words of encouragement which at times have been much needed. We moved in to 82 The Square last September and spent some of the winter getting the holly hedges and weeds under control. (Photo 1) At the start of spring we laid a path and base for the summer house and created a flower bed, (photo 2) then imported some soil and sowed seeds for the first part of the lawn, added a fence and arbour at the edge of the patio.(photo 3) We then created a gravel courtyard the other end of the house. (Photo 4 and 5) In the last few weeks we have prepared for and laid more lawn seed and will soon start preparing the ground for some meadow seed and wildflowers at the far end of the garden.(photo 6) Mick and I are novice gardeners and are bound to make mistakes and have some failures so watch this space!

#### **Recipe for Toffee Apples**

- 8 Granny Smith apples
- 400g golden castor sugar
- 1 teaspoon vinegar
- 4 tablespoons golden syrup



Place the apples in a large bowl, then cover with boiling water (you may have to do this in 2 batches). This will remove the waxy coating and help the caramel to stick. Dry thoroughly and twist off any stalks. Push a wooden skewer or lolly stick into the stalk end of each apple. Lay out a sheet of baking parchment and place the apples on this, close to your stovetop. Tip the sugar into a pan along with 100ml water and set over a medium heat. Cook for 5 mins until the sugar dissolves, then stir in the vinegar and syrup. Set a sugar thermometer in the pan and boil to 140C or 'hard crack' stage. If you don't have a thermometer you can test the toffee by pouring a little into a bowl of cold water. It should harden instantly and, when removed, be brittle and easy to break. If you can still squish the toffee, continue to boil it. Working quickly and carefully, dip and twist each apple in the hot toffee until covered, let any excess drip away, then place on the baking parchment to harden. You may have to heat the toffee a little if the temperature drops and it starts to feel thick and viscous. Leave the toffee to cool before eating. Can be made up to 2 days in advance, stored in a dry place.

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



