With next year, 2014, being the start of a 4 year period of commemoration of WW1, the committee have discussed and agreed, because of its association as a military hospital, that the word Memorial should be included in the name of the hall, so it would be called "The Maiden Bradley Memorial Hall".

We have approached the trustees of the hall and they have agreed to the change of name. If any member of the community has any objections to the change can you please put them in writing and submit them to the committee.

On Friday 11th October we will be having a Lunch in the hall that will raise funds for both the hall and the village shop. Places will be limited so please book early; the cost will be £5.00pp. You can put your name on the list at either the shop or at the coffee mornings on Fridays.

Our new heating system is now up and working and the difference is there for all to feel. We also now have a land line (01985 845303) and the internet is on its way, with thanks to the Parish Council who have given a grant of £100 towards the set up, so the hall has taken its 1st steps into the 21st century!

Poppy Appeal - 2013

It is 70 years since Operation Chastise was mounted. Its aim to use specially adapted 30-tonne Lancasters carrying experimental 'bouncing bombs' to breach three dams along the Ruhr Valley, the powerhouse of Germany's industrial region. It was invented by Dr Barnes Wallis who realised the possibility of such a feat as he skimmed marbles over water tanks in his back garden. Wing Commander Guy Gibson, only 24, was tasked with finding crews for 617 Squadron, choosing from the cream of Bomber Command. Their task, to fly at the equivalent height of a medium-sized tree, dropping a bomb with pinpont accuracy, avoiding torpedo nets, to bounce along the surface of the water spinning at over 500 rpm before reaching its target. An almost impossible feat. On 16th May 1943 after a traditional flying supper of bacon and eggs the aircraft took off in three waves. Known by most of us today as the Dambusters Raid, its success possibly altered the course of the war but came at a heavy price. Fifty three men lost their lives that night, a further 31 including Guy Gibson dying before peace was declared. Their courage and heroism is mirrored in those serving our country today. 617 Squadron served in Afghanistan in 2012 completing a total of 600 missions. At the Legion-run Battle Back Centre many present day servicemen have found their futures transformed. I like to feel that those who took part in the Dambusters raid would be uplifted by our positive support for those injured in conflict today, and our continuing remembrance of their own courage and sacrifice in the air that May night.

Our house to house collections are licensed to start on 26th October and continue until 9th November. Those kindly collecting are David Morse (High Street, Frome View), Mary Stevens (The Knapp, Barcroft and Frome Road), Diana Stevens (Church Street, Somerset Arms side), Pippa Brierley (Church Street, Village shop side, outlying farms). The Village Shop will have one static point and the Somerset Arms, two.

Please remember that if you are a taxpayer and use a Gift Aid Envelope the Royal British Legion can reclaim from the Inland Revenue 25p for every £1.00 given. Over £215 pounds was raised in this way during the 2012 Appeal. The Collectors have a supply of envelopes. Please do ask for one.

Settle down with your favourite beverage and enjoy the show - it's a real eye-opener!

Parish Council 10th September 2013

Fleur de Rhe Phillipe reported to Council on the New Wiltshire Council Members, the financial issues that they were working on, Highways Street Scene and the new Contractor change over issues that had been experienced. She informed Council that she has now changed her portfolio and that she was now Cabinet Member for Economic Development, Skills and Strategic Transport. She updated Council on the bid to be made to government re the A303 feasibility study and issues that have occurred near Stonehenge. Council informed Fleur that it looked forward to hearing in the near future that there are some improvements re Highways.

Planning - The below applications were discussed and commented on:

13/00987/LBC Bradley House Kingston Lane Maiden Bradley, Proposal: Reinstate outside door on rear elevation

Resolved: to support the application

13/02680/FUL 32 Church Street Maiden Bradley, Proposal: Replacement Single Story Rear Extension

Resolved: to support the application

(Please note: in planning matters the Council acts as the consultee of the Principal Authority. The Principal Authority being the deciding body)

Best Kept Village Competition - Maiden Bradley with Yarnfield had been joint third in the County with Steeple Ashton. The general comments feedback were that the residential gardens of Maiden Bradley were well presented as were the pub and the shop, both of which were neat and tidy and clear of litter. Churchyard was very well maintained. The area of green around the Horse Trough was well presented and noticeboards were in good order and up to date. The bus stop shelter was neat and tidy as were the grounds of the Village Hall which had recently been cleared. The playing field area was well maintained but somewhat blighted by the old swimming pool and some broken fencing the point of which the judges were unclear on. A number of uncut verges e.g. the roadside of the playing field would benefit from regular maintenance.

Summary: the points made in the judge's report are there to highlight the good and less good points noted when the villages were judged. All the villages should be pleased with the overall high standard that they achieved and note that it is only little things here and there that can make a difference between winning or not. All the villages should keep up the good work they do in maintaining their villages to such a high standard and be proud that they have represented their district in the County round.

Parish Steward/Highways – it was reported that the weeds require attention in Church Street, The Clerk mentioned that this was on a work ticket already raised, that the leaves down by Councillor Patrick Nixon's residence require clearing from the traffic calming island. The Clerk was asked to email Tracy Myers advising that the sweeper had visited the parish but the work had been actioned to a poor standard; there had still been no pavement sweeping and several drains were blocked. The Clerk informed Council that she would follow up these items.

Maiden Bradley Chapel - Council noted that the Clerk had been informed by Edward Bizzey, Director of the company Clanfield Properties with whom the Wessex Trust Charity has placed the building that the building was to be sold at Auction.

Parish Plan outcomes – Council discussed the issues arising from the reviewed Parish Plan/Handbook and agreed the answers to the following questions below:

A) Do whatever it can to ensure the continuation of the weekly GP Surgery and prescription Service – (Village Hall extension support). The Village Hall to be supported by the Parish Council, financially and in any other way it lawfully can.

B) Carry out a review of listed buildings and other sites where listing might be warranted. Council instructed the Clerk to ask a particular parishioner if they would take on the above project.

C) Liaise closely with designated police staff and the parish news to publish relevant information and advice from the police as part of this, Council will take an initiative designed to get an active Neighbourhood Watch going once again, and look into the case for a linked farm watch. (Attendance at Rural Policing Neighbourhood Tasking Group meetings etc). The Clerk will continue to liaise with the Rural Policing Team and attend the meetings.

Council would like to ask parishioners if they would take the time to think about becoming the Neighbourhood Watch Representative in the parish. Training would be provided and all that is required is good communication skills to take on the role. Please contact the Clerk if you are interested in this position, using the below contact details.

D) Governance is a theme in Maiden Bradley's 2005 Plan, but appears to be excluded from the topic headings for WVCP. The view from our community is that it is appropriate for us to have the opportunity to appraise and receive information about the way we are governed, and that covers the work of the Parish Council, Warminster Area Board and Wiltshire Council. Council will press for its recognition. Council instructed the Clerk to attend on behalf of the Council the Area Board meetings and WVCP meetings so that she can feed back to Council reports from both the meetings.

E) Support voluntary activity by enabling training and seeking to combat the impediments posed by the increasing demands of Health and Safety compliance, and high insurance costs. Council understand that the Trustees have reported that the swimming pool was to now be filled in. They will continue, through the Clerk, to inform Groups and Clubs when training and other relevant information is received by the Parish Council, and support all groups and clubs in any way lawfully that it can.

Forward Planning Prepare Budget – it was agreed that the repairing of the Knapp fencing is one of the items possibly to be considered in the Budget as it was highlighted on last year's maintenance list.

Grant Applications – Groups and Clubs are asked to contact the Clerk if they wish to apply to the Council for a Grant for next year so that Council can take them into consideration when actioning the budget. Council discussed the grant application received from the Village Hall Committee and approved £100.00 towards the cost of providing an internet connection in the Village Hall.

Items for the next Agenda: Policy Documentation and Community Radio

Date of the next meeting- The Council agreed that Tuesday 8th October 2013 would be the date of the next Parish Council meeting. The Parish Council Meeting will start at 7.30pm. All are welcome to attend. As always, the Parish Council meeting will be open at the start with an opportunity for members of the public to ask questions or make comments on any matter. From Behind The Counter

As I write this piece we are two thirds of the way through the month of September. This is the last month of our financial year and I must say that, sales-wise, it has been a bit flat. I hear from other shop keepers and our suppliers that everyone is finding the same. I guess we must just be feeling that pinch between summer hols and the Christmas extravaganza. Personally, I am relieved that things have gone a bit quieter this month – it might reduce the sales target for next year that the Committee will be giving me!

So what is happening in our community shop in October.....?

Sam. Sam will be leaving us at the end of the month to go on maternity leave. Amanda, who has been our "Saturday Girl", and fill in for me when I am away, will be taking on Sam's hours while she is away. We will inevitably be altering our shift patterns so bear with us while we adjust to the new team and working arrangements.

Saturday Opening. As you know, for the summer months we have been staying open on Saturdays until 4pm. During July and August it worked well and, although we were not exactly humming, there was enough custom, mostly passing trade, to make it worthwhile, particularly up to 2.30pm. We now have to decide what to do for the winter. At the time of writing this, I am uncertain, but it is likely that we will close at 2.30pm (as opposed to the 1pm closing that we used to have), for a while and see how that goes. We will also, once again, be looking for a new person to join the Saturday rota (see separate item below).

Poundzone. I am not entirely convinced that the Poundzone is working. This is the set of shelving opposite the wine and beer section. The edible section of it is moving a bit, but the household section is not. What do you think? Should we keep it as it is for a bit longer, try different items on it or abandon it? As an alternative to that section I am considering moving our increasing range of crisps to that area and possibly also increasing our range of wines to include some cheaper lines which we would put on that side. What do you think?

Cards. We have again increased our display of greetings cards. I think these are an important part of the shop – having to go to town just for a card is annoying – so do please let me know if the range we have meets your needs. Christmas cards will be coming in during this month.

Wall's Ice Cream Freezer. As autumn sets in, we have reduced our supply of individual ice creams. However, I do intend to keep the Wall's freezer on for the winter season and to keep a modest supply of Magnums small tubs etc. for those who still fancy the occasional ice cream treat in spite of the weather. In the rest of the freezer I plan to display more items from the "Bake at Home" range to give you some ideas of what is available for you to take away and cook at home. So do check out that freezer from time to time as we will be trying different things to see what interests our customers (and therefore increases our sales and helps get me to the aforementioned, committee instigated, sales target!!)

Recipe -

It is the time of year when many of our youngsters are gearing themselves up to go to university and in many cases they will have to look after themselves – and that includes cooking their own food in some cases. Here is a nice easy recipe to give them some confidence; it is simple and nutritious and good for families too!



Spicy Sausage and Couscous

- 40 g couscous 1tablespoon oil
- 1 small onion chopped
- 1 garlic clove chopped
- 1 spicy snack sausage, sliced (or try choritzo instead)
- 125g frozen peas
- 230g can chopped tomatoes
- 1 tablespoon tomato puree
- 2 tablespoons water
- 2 teaspoons chilli sauce.



Make up the couscous as directed on the packet. This amount makes a 100g serving of couscous. Heat the oil in a saucepan and fry the onion and garlic for 5 minutes. Add the rest of the ingredients and simmer for 2 – 3 minutes. Serve with the couscous.

'Green' cheese for Whitesheet Primary

Local cheese producers Wyke Farms have invited Whitesheet Primary children in Year five and six to make table decorations for a really prestigious event – the opening of their new £multi-million biogas facility. The theme of the event is 'sustainability' and these decorations will be used to adorn the lunch tables at the launch event of the plant. Two of the children were invited to attend the opening event on September 20th - along with local press, customers of Wyke farms and many local dignitaries. Wyke farms plans to be totally energy self sufficient as a direct result of this initiative.

The school will also be able to visit Wyke Farm to learn more about sustainability and the cost of the curriculum visit will be funded by the company. School cook Helen Burton is also delighted to learn that she is being supplied with cheese for the school's kitchen.

This is an example of how the school can use the locality to enhance the curriculum. "We are really pleased to have been invited to be involved with a local industry," commented Head teacher Karen Brooker, "particularly in something like this which helps our school and the children so much."

Parents were asked to help by sending in any materials that will be classed as 'recycling' or 'sustainable' to help the children make their decorations – plastic bottles (small), cardboard, interesting small boxes, cheese cloth ribbons, wicker baskets etc – were all included on the list of sustainable items that could go into constructing the children's wonderful and imaginative table decorations.

19th September 2013 - Wyke Farms has today become the UK's first national cheddar brand to be 100% self-sufficient in green energy, following the launch of its biogas plant, situated in Bruton, Somerset.

The UK's largest independent cheese producer and milk processor, hosted the launch event, together with British journalist and political commentator Jonathan Dimbleby. Attended by local dignitaries, major retail supporters and



key stakeholders, the event saw hundreds visit Bruton – the home of Wyke Farms, the largest family-owned cheese maker in Britain.

The impressive biogas plant, which took five years to plan and construct, consists of three 4,600 cubic metre digester vessels. It will convert 75,000 tonnes of biodegradable waste materials from the farm and dairy per year, including pig and cow manure, into energy.

The plant will deliver significant environmental benefits; reducing and managing waste as well as producing energy, enabling Wyke Farms to save over 4 million kilos of carbon dioxide per annum. It also gives Wyke Farms the capacity to source its entire electricity and gas usage from both solar and biogas, as well as exporting power back to the grid.



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

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
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Welcome to Our New Landlord/Lady

It has been a bit of a bumpy ride for the Somerset Arms since Roy and Cate's hasty departure, but it now looks like it may be heading into calmer waters. Tim and Dee Dalglish have arrived from Wales and are already making great plans to turn the pub around and to stay with it for the long term. Their previous pub was the Queen's Hotel in Weymouth but they have been out of action for a while as Dee has been toughing it out against cancer. Having had the all-clear in January, she and Tim are now very keen to get back into pub action. Dee's background is entirely in the pub trade and Tim is a master butcher. Since they got together they have had a number of pubs, mostly working on behalf of breweries, taking on problem premises, turning them round so that they could be let again. They assured me though, that with our pub they are here to stay



as it is exactly what they have been looking for since Dee's recovery from her illness, a pub in a village with letting rooms and a good garden.

Tim and Dee are determined to make the Somerset Arms a proper village pub. The "restaurant" is to be renamed the "lounge bar" as they want to establish a "pub with food" and that food will be, as Tim puts it "good honest pub grub". As we sat chatting, workmen were busying themselves in the bar area putting in new central heating that will be linked to the Estate's woodchip boiler. This should reduce the cost of heating the pub and make it cosier for the customers. Tim will be head chef and the kitchen is being refurbished to his requirements. The pub is also going to get a redecorating face-lift. The book

wallpaper will finally go!! The letting rooms will also get some attention and Tim and Dee are thinking of making the rooms themed in tune with local amenities such as Longleat and Stourhead. The skittle alley is being given a spring clean so that it is useable for the coming season and then in due course will be properly floor-polished and then redecorated to make it a much better venue.
