A Year in the Chair

Having just stepped down as Chairman of the Village Shop Management Committee, I have been asked to pen a few words about my experience - dull it was not!

I was initially co-opted onto the committee at the invitation of the chairman, Alan Inwood, 18 months ago, when the pressing issue was the serious financial position: a loss of £6000 the previous year had been incurred, and corrective measures were under discussion. I was baffled as to what I could offer, as someone new to the village with absolutely no experience of retail or even the business sector! Despite these handicaps, I had both the arrogance of the medical profession and the common sense of the man in the street to fall back on, for, like car parking, running a shop is something on which many people think they are an expert.

Anyway, the committee cut costs across the board, and set about reversing the 8% decline in sales seen over the previous 2 years. Initially, the trading figures remained poor but we held our nerve. We believed in our plans - and believed in the shop! When Alan retired as chairman in September 2011, the yearly loss had been halved to £3000. The baton passed to me, probably because everyone else on the committee had been chairman at some point. We continued to modernise the shop and cut costs further, and as I knew nothing about shops, I arranged for visits from experts from the Plunkett Foundation and even the area training manager for the Co-operative.

I have just spent a week on a dutch sailing barge and was alarmed at first with how slow to respond they are - you pull the tiller over sharply to avoid a crash yet the massive hulk seems to just carry straight on regardless. That is how it seemed with the shop - despite serious efforts at cutting costs and increasing sales, we continued to head straight for the rocks. Things became so bad in the autumn last year that it is no exaggeration to say that we avoided closure by a whisker. Our debt total peaked at £9000. It was only thanks to the patience of staff accepting delays to their wages and one well known volunteer paying suppliers from her own bank account, that we stayed in business. Once the community responded to our bond issue and with a couple of interest free loans, we were able to restock the shop and press on with our programme of change, and then to our relief, sales figures leapt by 7% and continued to climb. As cashflow improved, we were able to try out new lines and promotions, and the recovery in sales has continued with some months' sales up by 11% compared with a year earlier. Anne, Kay, Sam and the army of volunteers have embraced change and ensured the shop looks good, feels good, and we are sure the recovery is sustainable. The longer opening hours and Kay's unpaid work as bookkeeper have made a huge difference. As we approach the end of our financial year, we are very excited to report that we are expecting to have made a small profit, and the shop's debts have been hugely reduced. For the actual figures, you will have to wait for the AGM!

There are always challenges for community shops of course, and despite the increasingly healthy financial state, we will be looking for grants to replace our chillers, for more volunteers, and to expand our customer base. Liz Nixon is taking over as Chairman and will, no doubt, have plans to further consolidate the shop's position. This has been a remarkable turnaround, and it has been a privilege to be involved in the team bringing this about. I was fortunate to have taken over as chairman when the plans laid under Alan's stewardship were finally bearing fruit, and to have had such a strong and enthusiastic band of people as committee, staff and volunteers.

In case you are wondering what my specific role in bringing about the changes was, bearing in mind I had no retail knowledge to contribute, I learnt that tonight. It was that I 'chucked a hand grenade in the middle of it'!

Recycling charity appeals for your unwanted domestic white goods

Since the white goods recycling charity Refurbiz was established in 2003, more than 8000 low income families in Wiltshire have benefited from around 12,000 quality, reconditioned, white goods at prices they can afford. However, in the current economic environment we are struggling to source enough feedstock to service our demand.

With people hanging on to their old models & machines for longer we are increasingly in need of unwanted free standing electric cookers, washing machines, dryers and refrigeration. We simply can't meet the demand we now have for them and if the economy continues to be slow and more people find themselves in difficulties, the demand is only going to go higher.

So please, if you are replacing any white goods, particularly electric cookers and working fridges, then phone us and we will come out and remove them free of charge (although, as a charity, donations to cover our fuel costs, etc., are always welcome!)

We screen the goods, restore those that can be repaired and then pass them onto those in need. Typically, the cost of a washing machine or cooker comes to about £85 with a three month warranty – vastly lower than buying new goods from the stores.

Any appliances that are beyond repair are stripped down to reusable components and finally any bits left over are sent to the Hills Waste Materials Recovery Facility, near Calne, for onward, licenced recycling, avoiding any waste electrical items going into landfill.

So, if you have any white goods you no longer want and wish to donate, you can help a family in need by contacting Refurbiz on 01380 720200.

If you know any person or family in need of a low cost washing machine, dryer, cooker or fridge, please tell them about us. Many of our items are displayed on our Facebook page.

Refurbiz operates out of the Hopton Park Industrial Estate in Devizes, and supplies refurbished white goods across Wiltshire and Swindon. The charity was set up by the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust nine years ago to encourage electrical waste to be reused for the benefit of those in need. It is an independent not-for-profit charity supported by self-generated income and charitable grants.

Mark Lucas-Phillips is doing a parachute jump in September in aid of Dorothy House Hospice in memory of his father, and the sponsor form will be in the Village Shop. He hopes to raise over £500. Please support him.

Ingredients:


- 1 peach, thinly sliced.

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

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
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
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Notes from Afghanistan

I am pleased to report that I arrived safely in Afghanistan at the end of July and immediately started a five-day training package carrying a rifle and wearing body armour and helmet (approx. 29 kilos in total) in 42 degrees, which was quite a shock to the system. I met a friendly search dog called Marsie, which was a welcome 'dog fix' having handed over my own dog to family the previous week.

The accommodation is great as my room has a comfortable bed and air conditioning, which is a real luxury. I'm sharing with another female, but we seem to pass like ships in the night. The dining facility is fantastic and there is a real risk that I will put on weight enjoying all they have on offer. I have decided to follow my colleague's advice and only have desserts at weekends! I am also steering clear of the hot plate for breakfast, instead opting for cereal and fruit. Fortunately, there is a large gym and fitness classes available, so if I am tempted to over indulge I will be able to work off the calories.



I have now ventured outside the wire (the Army expression for leaving camp to visit a location). The trip involved two helicopter rides (on an American CH 53 and a British Chinook) and a vehicle convoy in Lashkar Gah travelling in a large armoured vehicle, called a Mastiff. The vehicle commander, a young 2Lt, looked about 12 years old, but his multiple (group of soldiers) clearly knew what they were doing and I felt very safe throughout.

Back at camp I am reading into my job and getting to know the other staff officers. Most staff officers in the headquarters man their desks between 0800 and 2200 hours each day, with breaks for food and exercise, although my routine is likely to be more varied due to trips away from camp.

I am starting to acclimatise and getting used to the

presence of sand and dust on everything. At least sand is good for the skin. Here's a piccie of me sporting the latest fashion in headdress!
