# We Demand Better TUC March and Rally in London 18th June 2022

The Trades Union Congress is holding a major national march and rally in just over two weeks time to protest about the growing cost of living crisis. With inflation spiralling, workers are suffering and wages are failing to keep pace with rising bills for food, petrol and energy.

Why are we marching on Saturday 18th June? We are marching to demand We demand—

- A real pay rise for every worker – and a real living wage for all,
- Respect and security for all workers - ban zero hours contracts, ban fire and rehire, decent sick pay now
- End racism at work
- Tax energy profits to pay our bills
- Raise universal credit
- Boost union bargaining rights now



And more than that: we demand that the government listens and acts to support working people.

#### **Health conference**

Health branches of the union met in Liverpool from 25th to 27th April, the first big national conference for almost three years, thanks to the intervening pandemic. It was wonderful to be meeting and mixing with old comrades and friends again face to face after such a long break. But most importantly it was great to be meeting to be discussing matters of importance to our health group members, deciding policy and getting that sense of strength, collectivity and togetherness that only a good union conference can bring.

Our branch Chair, Zara Salisbury, was our branch delegate to this conference and our Branch Secretary, Mark Wareham, attended as an observer from the National Executive Council.

The conference started with a minute's silence in memory of health members and colleagues and Roz Norman, chair of the executive welcomed delegates and spoke of the lasting effect of COVID over the intervening three years, warning that the full impact on society may not be understood for years more. Praising the hard work of branches and regions, she

said: "Ours is a union that is equally adept at campaigning on the more localised, more targeted issues of the day," before drawing attention to the ongoing campaigns fighting car-parking charges, demanding employers treat the

Platinum Jubilee as an extra bank holiday and pursuing rebanding campaigns across the UK.

And on the Put NHS Pay Right conditions, worst working campaign she highlighted our action saying: "This is just the start, please do try to get involved – it's important that we all do our bit. "No one is under any illusion that this will be easy. But ours is a union that continues to deliver success - across all four nations of the UK."

Conference then got down to business and dealt with motions on a range of matters from equalities to health and safety and pay to staffing levels.

Eddie Woolley for the service group executive told delegates that, in the 10 years leading up to the pandemic, "we have been shouting from the rooftops about the lack of investment ... the government have done nothing."

Sue Highton reported that, in 46 years working in the NHS, she had "never seen the morale of staff so low". The union needed to "fight and lobby, to recruit and retain", she said.

Our very own Zara Salisbury

got up to speak up for workers in the private sector, an all too forgotten part of the health workforce who suffer poorer practices, lower pay and less security than NHS colleagues (see picture below). Zara also spoke at another motion on development and progression for healthcare assistants and highlighted the particular problem that workers in the private sector face in this regard.

There was a particularly contentious motion on the operation of the NHS Pay Review Body that went to a card vote that re-affirmed our current strategy of submitting evidence to the PRB, whilst seeking change to review how NHS pay is set with our preference for the reintroduction of negotiation.

It was an excellent and productive time on sunny Merseyside that left most delegates with a feeling of renewed vigour for the struggles ahead. Union conferences are really very important because organisations such as ours, that are built on people power, need this sort of communal time that online meeting never quite matches.


